
Program: Our Grandmothers Knew What They Were Doing!






Bromfield graduation - June 7, 2019

Bromfield graduation is almost here - June 7 - and we need volunteers to provide the flowers and help create the arrangements which make it a beautiful occasion for all.

Here's how you can help:

Providing flowers:

We need a variety of flowers, whatever is in bloom and looks good—peonies, iris, rhododendron, mountain laurel, leucothoe, weigela, poppies, solomon's seal, allium, lupine, baptisia, larkspur, delphineum, etc.. (I expect to have lots of kousa dogwood from a HES tree so cut yours only if it needs pruning.) All stems should be over 12" in length. In general select flowers that are just opening; rhodos in particular that are already in full bloom will likely look tired by the time of graduation.

Please bring your flower contributions to the library lawn Friday morning between 9 and 11. There will be buckets of water waiting there. Don't leave your containers —it's too confusing to get them returned. If possible, let me know ahead of time what kind of flower you plan to bring. (I realize you may not know what will be available until a few days before the 7th)

Try to cut your flowers Thursday evening and 'condition' them overnight. Alternatively, cut early enough in a.m. to allow 2-3 hours conditioning before bringing them over. It does make a difference in how they last! Take a clean bucket of warm water (they take up warm water better) with you into the garden and place flowers in water immediately as you cut them.

To condition:

- Add cut flower food to the water. You can make your own: add a half tsp bleach, 1 tsp sugar, and 1 tsp lemon juice (or vinegar) to 1 qt. warm water.
 - Remove the lower leaves from the stem of each flower. Remove as many of the leaves as you can, since they compete with the flowers for water.
 - Cut-off bottom of stem at a sharp angle, ½" 1" from the bottom of the stem, and place in warm water. For woody stems peel up some bark for an inch or two and slice the bottom of stem up into 2 or 4 parts.

 *Flowers should be left in the water for at least two or three hours, and preferably overnight, in a cool place. Submerge all the way up to the flower head for maximum hydration.

- We need help taking everything down after graduation—around 7— and putting things away. I also hope someone will coordinate distributing the leftovers to shut-ins. Let me know if you would do this!
- If you have flowers to donate but can't cut them or can't transport them, send me
 an email.
- If you can help cut or pick up flowers from others, please tell me. This is a job I really need someone else to take care of.
- If you can help on Thursday afternoon, I need someone strong to help me move the pedestals down to the library lawn and set them up.
- If you would like to go to the flower market early Thursday morning, I would be happy to have someone help.
