President Ponderings in August

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Here we are in the "The Dog Days of Summer" which is described in the Farmer's Almanac as an oppressive period of summer, between July 3rd and August 11th.

The phrase refers to the time the sun occupies the same region of the sky as Sirius the brightest star visible from any part of Earth and part of the constellation Canis Major, the Greater Dog.

This effect of the Sirius' light combined with the Sun's was thought to have an effect on plants, animals, and women, as well as men:

"But when the artichoke flowers, and the chirping grass-hopper sits in a tree and pours down his shrill song continually from under his wings in the season of wearisome heat, then goats are plumpest and wine sweetest; women are most wanton (pampered), but men are feeblest, because Sirius parches head and knees and the skin is dry through heat. " *Hesiod*, Works and Day

She has a special interest in native plants and ecology, but non-natives continue to be included in her gardens. However, she's pretty passionate about invasive plants that disrupt the ecological balance, and besides helping organize the garlic mustard pull as part of the town cleanup days, she puts a lot of effort into removing various invaders from her property, especially that nasty Japanese barberry.
