### September 25, 2023 NATIVE LAWN ALTERNATIVES

#### Speaker: Alexis Doshas

Nasami Farm Nursery Manager

Nasami Farm grows thousands of native seedlings from known wild ecotype seed. Alexis holds a master's degree in conservation biology from Antioch University New England and teaches many classes on propagation and native plant ecology for Native Plant Trust.

How can we as homeowners, land stewards, gardeners, and landscape professionals better support biodiversity and resiliency in our green spaces? Kill our lawns! - Or at least reconsider them.

In this informal and practical talk we will discuss ways to increase life and support healthy ecosystems through the use of native groundcovers. We will review tips and techniques for landscape transformations, and introduce a palette of native plants for various conditions.

Introducing the "KNOW YOUR LAND" Series in Harvard!

HARVARD'S CLIMATE INITIATIVE COMMITTEE is thrilled to announce the debut of our collaborative educational series, KNOW YOUR LAND. Designed to enlighten and engage, the series kicks off with an immersive event titled "*Forest Health in Harvard: the Good, the Bad, and the Healthy.*"

On October 14<sup>th</sup> (Rain date October 15<sup>th</sup>), join us for a guided walk through the conservation land at Horse Meadows Knoll and a portion of the Muller Trail where you will meet and talk with local forestry experts about forest health. You will learn how to recognize hallmarks of a robust forest and identify some of the invasive species threatening our green spaces. But that's not all! This event is for the entire family. At the heart of this endeavor is the series' mission: to empower our community with knowledge about Harvard's natural environments. By understanding how to care for and protect our land, we can ensure its health and beauty for generations to come.

Come, dive into nature, understand your land better, and become more aware of Harvard's beautiful forests. Together, let's embark on this journey towards a brighter, greener future!

- Location: Horse Meadows Knoll, Sherry Road, Harvard.
