ACTIVE MEMBERS REQUIREMENTS (Optional for Supporting Members)


Club activities and service projects give members hands-on opportunities to meet new people, learn, be creative and give back to our community. Our Garden Club thrives best when everyone is involved.

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Horticultural Meanders

Happy spring! What signals you that spring has finally arrived to you? Is it the peepers, the sound of redwing blackbirds, the whoosh of huge flocks of grackles? Maybe just the longer days and the warmth of the sun, or a favorite spring bulb like the crocus or snowdrop. Whichever it is, the temptation to get out there and get your hands dirty is strong.

Remember that although WE may think it's spring, a lot of 'good' insects are still sleeping and waiting for warmer days to come out from their winter resting places. Ideally days will average 50° before we do too much cleanup in the garden. Historically this looks to be about the second week of April.

I realize that it's very hard to wait but try to just take it slowly. For now, I'm going around cutting down tall spikes of perennial stems but not disturbing the leaf litter in my gardens.

This is a great time to do any pruning of woody plants while you can still see the structure. It's not too early for some things in the vegetable garden like planting peas I just heard a traditional saying from Margaret Roach on A Way to Garden: "When Spring peepers peep, plant your peas,". It certainly is time to be starting seedlings to be starting some seedlings for your vegetable garden inside, if you do that



I've heard a few questions about the winter sowing that we did: no, it is not time to take the tape off! The tape only comes off after you have seedlings growing. The extra warmth in that little greenhouse protects the young seedlings as well as helping germination. As the sun gets warmer, it is easy for this little greenhouse to get too hot, so I would suggest putting your milk jug in only partial sun if it's not there already. The soil will dry out very quickly when it gets too hot. You do need to start thinking

about whether the jug is drying out and needs to be watered, especially if we don't get much rain You can water with a gentle spray through the top. I wouldn't expect seedlings for several more weeks, depending on what species you planted and our temperatures. If you get them sooner, wonderful, but don't be discouraged if you don't see anything growing for 5 or 6 more weeks.
